It has been a pleasure listening to those members of the Covenant Support Team speak about their congregation and church experiences which have created a new buzz around Church communities. The creation of Warming Centres in winter when the temperature for homeless people drops to -10 degrees and below.

The fact that a Belleville United Church Congregation has delivered over 100,000 meals to the homeless and deprived population of that city. All outreach which would have been unthinkable for these congregations several years ago. Yet progressive ministry and members reached out to the underprivileged communities, stepping up to the plate to fulfill gaps in the services offered in that area. Consultative groups have been formed to enable moving forward with confidence bred from experience of other entities.

In today's complex environment we must think outside the box of traditional behaviour and consider new areas of service A Jesus move.

Sounds rather far-fetched. Believe me, it is not. In a recent Retirees Network meeting where we reached out to another region for support, we posed the question:

We invited those present to hear from two retirees from the Retirees Forum Clergy answer this question in their own way:

They were Rev. Elizabeth Macdonald and Rev. Dr Wayne Hilliker.

The question discussed was:

We invite you to join us in a conversation about how our experience in pastoral ministry might be helpful in addressing the issues facing those in ministry today. For example: changing perspectives in theology, communicating the gospel in a mostly secular/unchurched environment, lack of financial and other resources. Two members of the leadership team will offer their answers and then we will break into small groups where we can all respond.

In addition, we spread the invitation further to include Horseshoe Regional Council retired clergy and this brought additional interest from several individuals.

The talk commenced with the dialogue of 10 minutes from Elizabeth followed by Wayne. We broke up into small groups to discuss what had been the answer of the 2 members of the Retirees Forum. The discussion was so successful that we ran out of time after about 30 minutes of break out discussion. About 20 members were in attendance with several from HRC and several sending regrets.

I would believe that our next Network meeting will be equally as successful, and again we will reach out to other interested regions.
